Radars, Wrenches, and Roars of Laughter - A chat with a Technical Titan, Group Captain Nagendra Kumar Singh.

As part of a student-led initiative to explore inspiring career paths, we, the Editorial Team, had the privilege of interviewing Group Captain Nagendra Kumar Singh, a respected officer in the Indian Air Force, who shared insights into life in uniform, the challenges of the profession, and the spirit of serving the nation.

Mr. Singh shared his journey in the Air Force, beginning with an early interest in aviation and a strong desire to serve the country. After clearing the rigorous selection process and undergoing intense training, he/she was commissioned into the Air Force.

A Moment from the Interview

Editorial Team - Good Morning Sir!

Let's start from the cockpit — figuratively of course. What exactly was your job in the Indian Air Force?

Mr. Singh -

I worked in the technical branch. As Group Captain, it was my job to look after the different aircrafts that arrived at the base.

Editorial Team -

Sir, We have always imagined the Air Force life to be high - paced 24/7 action.....but what were your actual work hours like?

Was it a strict 9 to 5 or more of a "whenever-the-jet-sneezes-you-fix-it-deal"?

Mr. Singh -

The work hours were never consistent. Whenever a jet or an airplane arrived at the base we were supposed to attend to it, whether it was 10 in the night or 3 in the morning.

When asked about a typical day in the Air Force, Mr. Singh described a routine that starts before dawn. Physical training, mission briefings, operational duties, and continuous learning are all part of the day.

The officer openly spoke about the sacrifices involved—long separations from family, working under pressure, and facing life-threatening situations. Despite this, he expressed immense pride in wearing the uniform.

The interview left a lasting impression. Listening to Group Captain Nagendra Kumar Singh reminded me that behind every uniform is a story of hard work, sacrifice, and unshakable patriotism. It also highlighted that while the path to the Air Force is challenging, it is equally rewarding. As students, we often dream of big careers. Speaking with someone who lives that dream in service of the nation was both a humbling and motivating experience.

OPERATION SINDOOR

Operation Sindoor –

A Smart Strike, But Did We Really Win? In May 2025, India launched Operation Sindoor, a sharp, high-tech military strike on nine terror camps across Pakistan and PoK. These sites were linked to well-known terror groups. India used Rafale jets, missiles, loitering drones and even blocked cyberattacks mid-strike. Powerful? Yes. Precise? Definitely. It was a clear reply to the brutal Pahalgam attack, and it showed India's strength and advanced defence systems in action. But here's the catch: Was it a success just because we hit targets? Or is there more to winning than just explosions? Terrorism isn't a building – it's a mindset. One airstrike can take down a camp, but not an idea. Groups like these aren't wiped out with missiles; they move, regroup, recruit. And sometimes, hitting back just adds fuel to their fire. Some might call this "retaliation with restraint" but others would say it's reaction without resolution. But the best battles are the ones we never have to fight in the first place.

"A missile may silence a camp, but only peace can silence a cause." India showed its power. Now it's time to show its purpose. Let's not make precision strikes a monthly habit — missiles are cool, but stability? That's the elite.

OPERATION SINDOOR

Operation Sindoor was a significant military operation launched by India on May 7, 2025, in retaliation for a terror attack in Pahalgam, Jammu and Kashmir, that killed 26 civilians in April 2025. It marked a notable shift in India's military doctrine, emphasizing precision, restraint, and the effective use of indigenous technology by showcasing the primary objective was to dismantle terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) linked to groups. Seamless synergy between the Indian Army, Air Force, and Navy, utilizing advanced surveillance, intelligence and precision.

Operation Sindoor is widely viewed in India as a successful military endeavor that achieved its immediate objectives and showcased India's growing military capabilities and technological self-reliance. It has been presented as a strong message to adversaries and a demonstration of India's resolve against terrorism. However, like any significant military action, it has also generated debate and scrutiny, particularly regarding transparency and its broader geopolitical implications. The emphasis on indigenous technology and the demonstrated effectiveness of Indian-made systems are particularly noteworthy aspects of the operation.

"Operation Sindoor", this name itself has the ability to answer the question from India after the Pahalgam attack.

Operation Sindoor was held on 7th May 2025, which was claimed on the lives of 26 innocent civilians. 



The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), India's ruling party since 2014, is widely recognized for its strong leadership under Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the effective implementation of key policy decisions, such as the abrogation of Article 370. The party has also introduced a range of welfare schemes that have significantly bolstered its support base. Additionally, it is often credited with pursuing economic reforms, boosting infrastructure development, and adopting a robust stance on national security and foreign policy—all underpinned by a highly efficient organisational structure.

However, the BJP faces considerable criticism regarding economic challenges such as unemployment and inflation. Concerns about the erosion of federalism, the weakening of democratic institutions, and accusations of promoting social polarization and discrimination against minority communities due to its Hindutva ideology are also raised. Issues like farmers' protests, alleged suppression of dissent, and rising income inequality frequently surface as points of contention for those critical of the party's governance. As a result, its record remains a subject of both strong support and sharp opposition in India's political landscape.





TORNA FORT
Torna Fort, also known as Prachandagad, is a large fort located at southwest of Pune in the Western Ghats of the Sahyadri mountain ranges at the base village Velhe. It was the first fort captured by Shivaji in 1646 at the age of 16. It has an elevation of 1,403 meters above sea level. This fort is believed to have been constructed by the Shiva Panth in the 13th century. In 1646, Shivaji captured this fort and renamed as "Torna", and constructed several monuments and towers within it.

Malhargad Fort
A Hidden Gem of Maratha History
Malhargad Fort, also known as Sonori Fort, is one of the lesser-known but historically important forts near Pune, Maharashtra. Located about 30km from Pune city, it stands tall at around 3100 feet above sea level, offering breathtaking views of the surrounding hills and valleys. What makes Malhargad special is that it was the last fort built by the Maratha Empire. Constructed in 1757 by Peshwa Sardar Bhivrao Yashwantrao Panse, the fort was meant to monitor the Dive Ghat region, a key pass in the Sahyadri Hills. The fort gets its name from Lord Malthari (Khandoba), whose temple is located at the top. The climb of the fort is short and easy, making it a great spot for history lovers, trekkers and nature enthusiasts. Although much of the fort is in ruins today, its strong stone walls, bastions, water tanks and the serene temple still speak of its glorious past. Malhargad is not just a fort, but a symbol of Maratha pride and architectural skill.

Rules of Chess

Key Rules:

- Check: When King is under attack, the king can move to any square where he is not under attack.
- Castling: A special move involving the king and rook, which can be done under specific conditions.
- En Passant: A special pawn capture.
- Pawn Promotion: If a pawn reaches the opposite end of the board, it can be promoted to any other piece based on the player's choice.
- Touch Move Rule: If a player touches their own piece, they must move it. If it is a legal move, if they touch the opponent's piece, they must capture it if it is legal to do so.

Chess And Chess Master

King - Moves 1 square in any direction
Queen - Moves horizontally vertically or diagonally any number of square
Bishop - Moves diagonally any number of square



KABADDI

Introduction:

- Kabaddi is a contact team sport played between two teams of seven players. It is one of the traditional games of South Asia.
- According to the sport's origins, kabaddi is a sport developed centered on "Jallikattu".
- The establishment of the All-India Kabaddi Federation in 1950.
- Traditionally been played on muddy surfaces in villages. Now it can be on proper kabaddi court.

How to play:

- Each team has seven players, and they take turns sending one brave "raider" into the enemy's territory.
- The raider's job is to tag as many opponents as possible while chanting "kabaddi, kabaddi" without stopping. It's like holding your breath while playing tag.
- In this game, a raider enters the opposing half of the court to touch defenders and attempt to return within 30 seconds without being tackled. Points are awarded for successful tags, while defenders earn a point for stopping the raider. Tagged or tackled players are temporarily out but can re-enter when their team scores. Raids alternate between teams throughout the game.

Rules:

Time limit : 30 seconds

- Raider must cross the baulk line on the opponent's side,
- The raider must chant "kabaddi" continuously without pause while in the opponent's half,
- Defenders must prevent the raider from returning to their own half,
- A raider can be stopped by being grabbed by the limbs or torso, and
- Teams alternate between raiding and defending.


